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CHAPTER ONE:

INTRODUCTION

Background

Development planning in Kenya began formally after independence in 1963. The first national development plan in Kenya was made in 1964 with an initial seven-year plan (1964-1970). The plan was later revised into a five-year plan (1966-1970) in 1966 through the Sessional Paper Number 10 of 1965 on “African Socialism and its Application to Planning in Kenya”. The Sessional Paper provided the basis for the preparation of subsequent five-year national development Plans, Poverty Reduction Strategy Papers and the Economic Recovery Strategy. In June 2008, Kenya like many other many African countries developed a long-term Vision with ambitious economic growth targets and social development objectives. Kenya Vision 2030 was launched as the nation's long-term development blueprint to be implemented in 5-year successive Medium-Term Plans.

With regard to decentralized planning, Kenya instituted the Special Rural Development Programme (SRDP) in 1967 as an experimental effort at the sub-district level to conduct integrated development activities aimed at increasing rural income and employment opportunities. The SRDP led to the emergence of District Development Grants in 1971 as means of financing locally defined projects and revitalising District Development Committees. The decentralization process took full effect on 1st July 1983 with the adoption of the District Focus for Rural Development (DFRD) which transformed the districts into the focal points for identifying, initiating, planning and managing rural development through District Planning Units. The District Planning Units were responsible for the development of District Development Plans that were linked to the national plans.

The Constitution of Kenya ushered in a devolved system of government consisting of the National and 47 County governments, which are distinct but interdependent. To entrench the spirit of devolution, Article 220(2) (a) of the Constitution gave rise to the enactment of various Acts of Parliament providing the requisite legal framework to guide integrated county development planning. A County Integrated Development Plans (CIDPs) provide a framework for planning, budgeting, funding, monitoring and evaluation of programmes and projects in five-year terms. The CIDPs ensure counties' programmes and projects are aligned to the national aspirations as contained in the Kenya Vision 2030 and its Medium-Term Plans. It is implemented through a rolling one-year plan (Annual Development Plans) where programme-based budgets are drawn. So far, the First- and Second- Generation CIDPs have been developed and implemented.

Rationale

Article 186 and 220(2)(a) of the Constitution assigns the national government the role of prescribing the structure of the county development plans and support to counties on economic policy and planning. Sections 102(h), 104(1) and 108 of the County Government Act 2012, require county governments to prepare 5-year County Integrated Development Plans which are the basis for appropriation of funds. Further, Section 104 (1) of the Act obligates the county governments to plan for the county and no public funds should be appropriated without a planning framework.

The Constitution of Kenya

The Fourth Schedule of the Constitution assigns the National Government the role of national economic policy and planning while County Governments are responsible for county planning and development. Article 10 (2) of the Constitution on national values and principles of governance further prescribes the need for good governance, integrity, transparency and accountability, and sustainable development. Article 118(1) b provides for public participation in public policy processes.

Kenya Vision 2030 and Its Medium-Term Plans

The Kenya Vision 2030 aims at creating “a globally competitive and prosperous nation with a high quality of life by 2030”. It also aims at transforming Kenya into “a newly industrializing, middle-income country providing a high quality of life to all its citizens in a clean and secure environment”. The Vision is being implemented through successive five-year Medium-Term Plans at the national level. The theme of the Fourth Medium Term Plan, 2023-2027 is: “Accelerating Socio-economic Transformation to a more competitive, Inclusive and Resilient Economy”. This is driven by the need to: transform our economy; create the much-needed wealth and employment; reduce poverty and inequality; and create a conducive environment for investment.

County Integrated Development Plans (CIDPs) are expected to be aligned to the national development framework – the Kenya Vision 2030 and its Medium-Term Plan. Additionally, the CIDPs should incorporate the relevant aspirations of regional development frameworks such as the East African Vision 2030 and the continental Agenda 2063. Similarly, international commitments and obligations such as the 2030 Agenda and Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), the Paris Agreement on climate change and the Sendai Framework, among others, should be incorporated into the CIDP.

County Government Act, 2012

Section 108 of the County Government Act, 2012, requires county governments to prepare a 5-year County Integrated Development Plan and annual county budgets to implement them. In Section 102 (h) of the Act, county planning is expected “to provide a platform for unifying planning, budgeting, financing programmes, implementation, and performance review”. A County Planning Unit shall be responsible for “coordinated integrated development planning”. County plans will have the goal of promoting harmony with national and other county plans, land-use plans, urban planning and environmental conservation. Further,

Section 104 (1) of the Act states that “a county government shall plan for the county and no public funds shall be appropriated without a planning framework developed by the county executive committee and approved by the county assembly”. It also states that the county planning framework shall integrate economic, physical, social, environmental and spatial planning. In addition to the county integrated development plan, county governments are expected to have the following: County Sectoral Plan (10 years); County Spatial Plan (10 years); and Cities and Urban Areas Plan (5 years).

These county plans as provided in Section 107 (2), shall be the basis for all the planning and budgeting in a county.

Preliminary

Muslim Women Advancement of Rights and Protection (MWARP) through the COVID-19 response project which is funded by the European Union through the Agha Khan Foundation held four sectorial working groups meetings with Social Protection, Culture and Recreation, Education, Health and the Agriculture and Rural Development sector stakeholders in Lamu County at Utamaduni Center Hall between 14.09.2022 to 19.09.2022 in Lamu Island to review the performance of the Lamu County CIDP 2018 – 2022 in the different sector and as well as capture their inputs in the development of the Lamu County CIDP 2023 – 2027 CIDP. The meetings were mobilized and coordinated through the Lamu County Department of Finance, Budget, Strategy & Economic Planning.

The participants who attended the meeting included:-

For the health sector working group, the meeting brought on board the CEC Member in charge of Health in Lamu County, County, Chief officer, in charge of health, Director of Medical Services, Director of Finance and Budgeting, Health care practitioners, Assistant County Commissioner, Lamu County officer of National Council of Persons Living with Disabilities civil society organizations and community members.

For the Social Protection, Culture and Recreation Sector brought on board Lamu county youth coordinator, the chief officer in charge of the budget, the director of budget and economic planning, the children officer, the director of social services, Faza Youth Action Group, Lamu youth talent alliance, Lamu Women Alliance, business person, gender officer, Kiunga youth Bunge, an officer from the sports department, assistant county commissioner, Media, Technical University of Mombasa (Lamu campus), Red cross, Kiunga Youth Bunge, and other organizations.

For the Education Sector, the meeting brought on board Chief officer of education, Chief officer of budget and economic planning, Director of the Budget and economic planning, the County auditor Ministry of education, the Director of Teachers Service Commission, Chairman KEPSHA, ECDE supervisor, Sub- County education officers, Media, Technical University of Mombasa, Staff from the Department of Education, The manager of Mpeketoni vocational training centre, MWARP board member and members of civil society organizations working in Lamu County.

For the Agriculture and Rural Development, the meeting brought on board County Executive Committee Member of Finance, the chief officer in charge of the budget and economic planning, the Director of the budget and economic planning, the Director of fisheries and blue economy, the Chief Office of Fisheries, the Director of livestock and cooperative, the Director of Agriculture, Lamu East Sub County Veterinary Officer, County Veterinary, the Media, Technical University of Mombasa Lamu Campus, Local Farmers, fishermen, officials from Beach Management Units, Coast Regional Manager- Aga khan Foundation, MWARP staff, County Executive Committee Member of Finance, and other representatives from civil society organizations working in Lamu County.

The meeting participant lists is attached in annexe 1 at the end of the policy brief.

In the meeting, after conducting a review of the implementation of the second generation CIDP in the four sectors in Lamu County, the participants were able to come up with the sector priorities and strategies for inclusion in the Lamu County CIDP 2023 – 2027 CIDP.

CHAPTER TWO:

THE SOCIAL PROTECTION, CULTURE AND RECREATION SECTOR

2.1: Review of the implementation of the Lamu County CIDP 2018 – 2022

The county department of Culture, Gender, Youth, Sports and Social Services; Cohesion and Special Programmes made presentations to share the sector performance in the second generation CIDP 2018-2022. The presentations include projects that have been achieved so far, ongoing projects, pending projects, and flagship projects that were in the second generation CIDP 2018-2022. Plenary discussions after each presentation were done to enrich the discussion to inform the priority needs for recommendations in the third-generation CIDP 2023-2027.

Notable issues from the presentation and the plenary discussion were as follows;

- Drug and substances abuse
- Radicalization and violent extremism
- Unemployment
- Lack of capital
- Poor implementation of the youths policy
- Poor sports infrastructure
- Lack of sports diversification with only male football given a higher priority
- Inadequate funding for sports programs
- Lack of proper implementation of the sport policy
- Lack of mainstreaming Persons living with disabilities and gender in sports activities
- Rising cases of child offenders /Children in conflict with the law in Lamu county
- Low political representation of indigenous groups/ communities in political positions capitalized on unclear nomination procedures

- Rising cases of revenge attacks which are generational, family or clan-based
 - High cases of Youth – Elderly conflicts over inheritance and resource ownership
 - Human-wildlife conflicts
 - Resource-based conflicts (pastures, farming land, fishing, harvesting of Mikoko, maritime resources, deforestation, and charcoal burning)
 - Fishermen conflicts with the LAPPSET project since they are prevented to access parts of the ocean which are close to the port
 - Geographical topology (Lamu East/communities living in the Islands feel that they are not reached by duty bearers since most government offices are located in Lamu West. (Lamu Island and Mpeketoni)
 - Lack of a GBV rescue centre
 - High rate of drug and substance use not only among youth but also in a proportion of the middle-aged population.
- Religious and ethnic polarization

CHAPTER THREE:

THE EDUCATION SECTOR

3.1 : Review of the Implementation of the Lamu County CIDP 2018 – 2022

Presentations from the county department of education were done to share the sector performance in the second generation CIDP. The presentations include projects that have been achieved so far, ongoing projects, pending projects, and flagship projects that were in the second generation CIDP 2018-2022 . Plenary discussions after each presentation were done to enrich the discussion to inform the priority needs for recommendations in the third-generation CIDP 2023-2027.

Notable issues from the presentation and the plenary discussion were as follows;

- Need for the training of teachers on teaching methodologies, especially after the rolling out of the Curriculum based education, especially for ECDE teachers and primary school teachers.
- The school calendar was disrupted due to the government directive of closing all schools when the COVID-19 prevalence was quite high. When the directive was

- lifted, the ministry of education revised a crush program for learners to catch up with the education curriculum and this has created a heavy toll on teachers, learners and parents.
- The education status in Lamu has not matched the national expectation of the ministry of education for basic, tertiary, and higher education. For so many years the performance of Lamu county in national examinations has been minimal. This has been contributed by the following reasons: the building of the learning institutions is not friendly to the learners. The school equipment is not enough for the ratio to the student population.
- Some of the ECDE centres that have been built by the county government lack appropriate learning equipment and sufficient professional instructors.
- At the primary level inadequate schools make children walk for a long distance, hence some students find it difficult to access schools leading to a high school dropout rate, low retention rate, and incompleteness of the education cycle.
- The performance in national examinations is very poor compared to other Counties making few youths access higher education with very many accesses to vocational training.
- The vocational training institutions have insufficient equipment and permanently employed qualified instructors. This makes the instructors look for greener pastures leaving the learners without instructors in the middle of the learning cycle.
- Out of three major flagship projects including the second generation CIDP, only one which is a bursary and scholarship program was implemented successfully. The other two projects, Lamu county educational resource centre and the school feeding program were not implemented due to scarcity of resources.
- Another concern raised during the meeting was an unequal distribution of the ECDE centres in Lamu county; in the Lamu West sub-county 12 ECDEs were constructed, while Lamu central and Lamu East has 2 ECDEs each.
- Participants appreciated the efforts and achievements that have been realized by the department of education. Among the achievements are the bursary and scholarship program, which has increased secondary school enrollment and performance in the KCPE examination. Any student who achieved 300 marks and above gets a full scholarship from form one to form four. This has boosted the morale of both parents and students to concentrate fully on education.

CHAPTER FOUR:

HEALTH SECTOR

4.1: Review of the Implementation of the Lamu County CIDP 2018-2022

Presentations from the county department of health were done to share the sector performance in the second generation CIDP 2018-2022. The presentations include projects that have been achieved so far, ongoing projects, pending projects, and flagship projects that were in the second generation CIDP 2018-2022. Plenary discussions after each presentation were done to enrich the discussion to inform the priority needs for recommendations in the third-generation CIDP 2023-2027.

Notable issues from the presentation and the plenary discussion were as follows;

- Funding challenges – access, flow, distribution, of funding from treasury and the county department of finance disputes some operations in health facilities with Lamu county heavily relying on the government's funding sources to support the department.
- The continued disadvantage of preventive health services due to inadequate resources.

- There was no midterm review done on the 2018-2022 CIDP
- Procurement challenges where the government directives force the county government to procure all its medication from KEMSA which results in some facilities lacking the requested medication and equipment due to bureaucracies in the procurement procedures.
- Change of priorities indicated in the 2018 – 2022 CIDP due to political ambitions of the leaders.
- Lack of integration of the health sector with other players/stakeholders
- Insecurity in some parts of Lamu has forced the department to close down some of its health facilities
- COVID 19 pandemic caught the county unprepared i.e. the county did not have an Intensive care unit facility and lacked quarantine facilities
- Industrial unrest – Doctors and nurses strikes disrupted some service delivery in the health department.

CHAPTER FIVE:

THE AGRICULTURE AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT SECTOR

5.1: Review of the Implementation of the Lamu County CIDP 2018 – 2022

Presentations from the Agriculture, Livestock, and fisheries departments were done to share the sub-sector performance in the second generation CIDP 2018-2022.

The presentations include projects that have been achieved so far, ongoing projects, pending projects, and flagship projects that were in the second generation CIDP 2018-2022. Plenary discussions after each presentation were done to enrich the discussion to inform the priority needs for recommendations in the third-generation CIDP 2023-27.

Notable issues from the presentation and the plenary discussion were as follows;

- Lack of policy on production, value addition, and marketing of crops (cotton, cashew nuts, and other nuts, bixa, simsim, coconuts, mangoes, watermelons citrus, for Lamu County
- Shortage of extension services
- Low funding for agriculture programs.
- Lack of input credit
- Sale of agricultural produce in the raw form
- Overreliance on rain-fed crop production
- High incidences of pests and diseases
- Post-harvest losses
- Weak farmer organizations
- Lack of updated data on agriculture (farmer records, value chains, acreages, production, and marketing data)
- Disruption of service provision by the department of Agriculture, Livestock, and fisheries due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Perennial droughts economically affected both farmers and livestock keepers.
- Constant harassment and arrests of fishermen by maritime authorities due to non-compliance to stipulated maritime and fisheries laws.
- Lack of compensation for livestock farmers whose grazing land was taken by the establishment of the Lamu port under the LAPSET project.
